This date coincides with the anniversary of the signing of the Document on Human Fraternity for World Peace and Human Coexistence by Pope Francis and the Grand Imam of Al-Azhar, Almed Al-Tayyed during Pope Francis' apostolic journey to the United Arab Emirates from February 3 to 5, 2019.

I invite you to read and promote this Abu Dhabi Declaration and the encyclical letter Fratelli Tutti, two very important documents of Pope Francis' social teaching. They will give you ideas and offer you ways to mark this International Day of Human Fraternity and to commit yourselves resolutely "to build human fraternity, safeguarding creation and the whole universe and supporting every person, especially those most in need and the poorest" as stated in the Abu Dhabi Declaration.
